Breck Foundation is at the forefront of efforts to safeguard children and young people online. Our organisation was founded in 2014 in response to the tragic loss of Breck Bednar, a 14-year-old boy who was groomed and murdered by an online predator. Our work aims to prevent this from ever happening again. Our work saves lives.

We reach thousands of children and young people in schools and other community settings with Breck's story every year. Our talks and educational materials fill a gap in the current UK curriculum that otherwise leaves children vulnerable to online grooming and exploitation.

With 98% of young people now active internet users, current and future generations grow up having to navigate new and evolving digital dangers. We are committed to making the internet a place where children can live, play and thrive in safety.

Why internet safety?




In the year 2000, only 26% of the UK population was using the internet. However, in 2021, 99% of children in the UK went online.

According to Ofcom, most parents with children under the age of 16 are worried about the type of content their child sees online, including violence, bad language, and sexual acts. Due to the everevolving digital landscape, we are facing an increasing number of unregulated online spaces that predators, groomers, scammers, and anyone seeking to cause harm can use.

It is children and young people who, in our shared online world, are most at risk.

Our founder, Lorin LaFave Gordon, believes that if Breck had heard the talk we deliver about grooming he would still be alive today.

Breck's Story:


We deliver online safety educational sessions that share Breck's Story with children of all ages to empower them to protect themselves against online grooming.

We can also deliver sessions on fake news and misinformation, online bullying/digital citizenship and digital wellbeing and mental health.

Neuroscience backs up what we already know from our sessions – that the telling of the story of Breck is a uniquely powerful tool. When we listen to stories, neural activity increases fivefold. Using Breck's realworld story is a unique angle that allows us to deliver powerful messages and get the type of response from attendees that generic sessions rarely get.

RISE e2e

Resilience Internet Safety Education: an End to End project

RISE e2e is a unique educational and support framework centred around online skills and digital safety, that we can adapt to the particular needs of your pupils, teachers and parents.

Your RISE e2e will be bespoke for your school. It will help your young people to thrive online by empowering them to spot danger signs and be digitally resilient.

The programme starts with a speaker session about Breck's story, then continues over the course of the academic year with a range of satellite presentations and workshops. Each has tailored content suitable for each school's unique circumstances, and a range of peer-led projects around safeguarding and safety. Sessions include fake news/misinformation, online bullying/digital citizenship and digital wellbeing/mental health.
